What an incredible year it's been at Chimp Haven. In addition to welcoming 42 new chimpanzees to the sanctuary this fiscal year, we reached a significant milestone and made great progress toward our goal of providing a wonderful sanctuary retirement for former research chimpanzees.

In May, with the arrival of Star, Leslie, Nichole, Maurice, and TJ, Chimp Haven officially became the world's largest chimpanzee sanctuary! The newbies have settled in wonderfully, and have already made lots of new friends in our growing chimpanzee family.

We're thrilled that, with the support of our partners and the dedication of our staff, we're welcoming more chimpanzees to the sanctuary than ever before. But of course, we want every eligible chimp to have their chance to come to sanctuary.

Earlier this year, the National Institutes of Health (NIH) formed a working group to assess the safety of relocating at-risk chimpanzees from research facilities to Chimp Haven, and recently, the NIH announced plans to create an independent panel of veterinarians to make final determinations on these cases. Chimp Haven has a proven track record of successfully transporting chimpanzees – even those deemed medically fragile – to a happy life at sanctuary, and we hope the NIH vet panel findings will open a path to bring as many chimps as possible to the retirement they deserve.

In the meantime, we continue to prepare for their arrival through a large-scale sanctuary expansion, including new multi-acre forested habitats, 15,000-square-foot corrals, state-of-the-art veterinary spaces, and more. The Welcome Them Home campaign is our commitment to making sure every chimpanzee eligible for transfer has a place at Chimp Haven. Construction is underway, slated for completion in 2020.

Most importantly, though, we continue our most important work: giving the chimps the life they deserve. We watched our chimpanzee family grow, and with it, watched friendships form through games of chase and grooming sessions in the sun. With your support we provided them with fresh, healthy foods, expert medical care, and daily enrichment to keep them thriving.

I am so thankful for our wonderful team – their dedication to the chimps is a daily inspiration. All of us at Chimp Haven feel incredibly lucky to do the work we do, and are thankful for the support you provide to make it all possible.

We're proud to partner with you as we continue this important work, and look forward to the day when we can say they're all home.


