Learn About Primates

This lesson is inspired by Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) principles. In this lesson, students will learn to identify unique traits of chimpanzees and will be able to identify ways in which humans and chimpanzees are similar.

What is a primate?

- · A primate is a type of mammal.
- · There are more 600 types of primates!
- Primates are social, which means they like to live in groups with other primates.
- · Primates can use tools like sticks and stones.
- Most primates are omnivorous, which means they eat plants and other animals.
- · Primates have hair like humans instead of fur like a dog or cat.

What is a Great Ape?

- · A Great Ape is a type of primate.
- · There are five types of Great Apes:
 - · Chimpanzees
 - Gorillas
 - Orangutans
 - Bonobos
 - Humans
- All Great Apes have thumbs that can bend to meet other fingers.
 Opposable thumbs help Great Apes climb trees, gather food, and use tools.













What is the difference between a Great Ape and a monkey?

- Apes have bigger bodies than monkeys.
- Monkeys have tails and apes do not.
- Apes have short noses while monkeys have snout-like noses.
- · Apes have bigger brains than monkeys.
- · Apes are built for swinging through trees while most monkeys are built for running across branches.
- Apes use tools and monkeys do not.

What is a chimpanzee?

- · A chimpanzee is a type of Great Ape.
- · Chimpanzees are humans' closest living relative! They share more than 98% of their genes with you and me.
- Chimp Haven treats each chimpanzee as an individual! Chimpanzees have likes, dislikes and big personalities just like you and me.
- Chimpanzees in the wild live in Africa.
- Chimpanzees have longer arms than legs so they walk on all four limbs. That's called knuckle-walking.
- Chimpanzees use tools like sticks to fish for ants and stones to crack open
- · Chimpanzees make noises and use their bodies to show what they are feeling. What are some of the ways that you show how you are feeling?
- One sound they make a lot is called a "pant-hoot." Pant-hoots are used to communicate many different things, but it normally means the chimp is excited about something. Each chimpanzee's pant-hoot is unique.
- Chimpanzees laugh when they play.
- Chimpanzees communicate like me and you. Hugging, patting on the back, and tickling to name a few! What are some of the ways that you communicate?
- Chimpanzees usually sleep at night and are awake during the day, but like us they wake up at night sometimes, and even take naps during the day.

What is Chimp Haven?

- Chimp Haven is a big sanctuary where chimpanzees live together in family groups, also known as troops.
- Chimp Haven is located in Louisiana.
- More than 300 chimpanzees live at Chimp Haven today!

















DIY Tool Building

Something that sets primates apart from other mammals is tool use! Great Apes are special because they have thumbs that can bend to touch other fingers for grasping objects and making the best use of their tool. Think about how you use tools. Can you imagine picking up a fork, writing your letters or zipping your coat without your thumbs? While Great Apes like chimpanzees look for tools in their habitats like stones and sticks, humans create all kinds of tools to get the job done! Create your own tweezer tool by following these steps.

Suggested Materials

Craft or Popsicle Sticks

Rubber Bands

Cotton Ball or other type Pom-Pom ball

Step 1

Gather your materials!

Step 2

Stack two sticks together.

Step 3

Place the cotton ball between the two sticks at one end.

Step 4

Add two or more rubber bands to the end where the cotton ball is.

Step 5

Put your tool to use! See what you can pick up with your tool. The bigger the cotton ball the wider the open end will be.

Step 6

Write down 5 things that you picked up using your tool!










Which is a monkey and which is a chimpanzee? Connect the dots to find out!
